You will be consulted in defining your future working conditions by your union between now and September 12, 2014. The identified priorities are: a reduction in the workload and job insecurity; an improvement in the working conditions in order to retain the healthcare professionals; and the recognition and enhancement of training/education.

Whether you are a nurse, licensed practical nurse, respiratory therapist or perfusionist, keep an eye on the bulletin boards in your institution and go to the assemblies!

A neighbourhood clinic will spring to life on the St-Sauveur fringes of the and neighbourhoods in the Basse-Ville of Quebec City. Its mission will be to offer the population front-line services provided by healthcare professionals thus improving access to health services. This clinic is an evolution of the SABSA health cooperative founded by Isabelle Tetu and Maureen Guthrie. At first looking after people with Hepatitis C or HIV, the two who started the project quickly realized that the needs for access to care affected a much larger part of the population. Unprecedented setbacks at the CSSS du Témiscamingue

The negotiation of the local collective agreement for the nurses, licensed practical nurses and the Syndicat des professionnelle respiratory therapists at the Centre de santé et de services sociaux (CSSS) du Témiscamingue is going very badly. After nine days of negotiation and three days of mediation, the employer is stubbornly

imposing unacceptable working conditions on the healthcare professionals. While an arbitration process should start shortly, the latter wants to make the workforce more flexible by rendering the shift and the home base as an indication only in order to reassign staff as he wishes from one site to another over a vast territory.

The healthcare professionals have mobilized to obtain respect for their working conditions by denouncing the situation in a press conference on June 19 and by circulating a petition.

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
